### Swim lesson safety tips for instructors

We learn about safety protocols for swim instruction — like class management and emergency procedures, but it never hurts to have a refresher. Take a look at these tips and reminders to make sure safety is top priority in your lessons.

#### Identifiable instructors

Students and parents need to easily recognize the instructors, even on a crowded pool deck. Wearing an "Instructor" shirt and name tag makes you identifiable from a distance. Introduce yourself to the parents and students to create a welcoming and comfortable environment.

#### Keep whistles and rescue aids at the ready

You never know when you'll need to signal for back up and jump into action. Always wear your whistle and keep an appropriate rescue aid within reach while teaching so you are prepared for anything.

#### Keep your eyes on the prize

Watching your entire class is a must, never turn your back when students are in the water. Stay on the deep end side of your class to intercept any swimmers drifting towards the deep end of the pool. If a student leaves the class for a moment, know where they are going and if possible, have a deck supervisor watch them. Choose the right formations for each activity, refer to page 37-42 of your *Instructor Manual* for a refresher.

#### Lifequarded Lessons

Going above and beyond is what makes your aquatic facility as safe as possible. If you can, schedule a "Lesson Guard" to be on duty and scanning during lessons. For sites with a team lead or deck supervisor they can patrol and assist with getting equipment or monitoring any swimmers that leave the deck for a bathroom break.

#### Be alert

The changeover between classes is often chaotic; swimmers leaving the pool, others arriving for their class and parents coming and going for pick up and drop off. Assign at least one National Lifeguard to supervise the pool during these transitions. Take agreed upon shifts to avoid leaving the deck without proper supervision.


#### Join us at our AGM
